Pastor's Ponderings...

Learning to Walk in the Dark

"I will give you the treasures of darkness and riches hidden in secret places, so that you may know that it is I, the Lord, the God of Israel, who call you by your name." Isaiah 45:3

I have been reading Barbara Brown Taylor's book, "Learning to Walk in the Dark" and have been deeply touched by it. She explores the darkness and why we have learned to fear it. She reflects on how our lives do not work only when everything is fully lit. We can't always see the light. It waxes and wanes or can go out altogether. What we long for is a spirituality and faith that also works in the nighttime, not only when we can see light.

Have you ever felt the darkness, "dark" emotions, or "the dark night of the soul"? Taylor talks about darkness as shorthand for anything that scares us. It could be the "dark" emotions, like grief and sadness. It could be the fear of dying, the fear of being alone, the fear of chronic pain, the fear of getting COVID-19, the fear of life never being normal again, or the fear of the monsters that live under the bed and only come out at night. The truth is that facing the dark, whatever it is that scares us, is terrifying.

The thing is, we learn things in the dark that we could not have ever learned in the light. As much as I hate to admit it, this suggests that we need the dark as much as we need the light. When my little Annie says to me, "Mom, I don't like the dark" or "I'm afraid of the dark", I try and help her be curious about it instead of just fearing it.

In the Bible, darkness often equals death, and light equals life. We are taught to be "children of the light". Those teachings and scripture have taught us to fear the dark, to stay away from it and create as much light as possible, but God lives in the darkness too. He shows up all the time

in Bible stories, meeting people in the dark. The exodus from Egypt happens in the dark. God parts the Red Sea in the dark. Jesus was born in a dark cave and rose from the dead in a dark cave. Seeds begin to grow, but only in the dark in the ground. New life begins in the dark! We have seasons of dark and light in our life, in our spiritual life. This is to be expected, not feared. Just like the moon waxes and wanes, so do we. We do not need to fear the darkness, instead be curious about it and ask what it can teach you.

"Sometimes the light is coming, and sometimes it is going. Sometimes the moon is full, and sometimes it is nowhere to be found. There is nothing capricious about this variety since it happens on a regular basis. Is it dark out tonight? Fear not; it will not be dark forever. Is it bright out tonight? Enjoy it; it will not be bright forever."

God is in the darkness too. Fear not.

"White Fragility is a state in which even a minimum amount of racial stress becomes intolerable, triggering a range of defensive moves. These moves include the outward display of emotions such as anger, fear, and guilt, and behaviors such as argumentation, silence, and leaving the stress-inducing situation. These behaviors, in turn, function to reinstate white racial equilibrium. This book explicates the dynamics of White Fragility and how we might build our capacity in the on-going work towards racial justice."

Administrative Council Meeting Minutes July 7, 2020 via ZOOM

<u>Online Attendance</u>: Carolyn Dahl, Diane Boris, Jim Leland, Ryan Herrick, Carole Hawkinson, Julie Manisto. Sandra Wilmot, Pastor Cynthia

Carolyn gave the opening prayer titled, "Justice for Peace".

<u>Secretary's Minutes:</u> The minutes of the secretary's report for June were approved. The motion was made by Carole and second by Julie. Motion approved.

<u>Treasurer & Financial Report</u>: Jim gave us the report as of the end of June. The June giving was \$5,100, - \$2,000 short to meet our budget. This is not an issue right now. We have \$2,600 left in the CARES loan. The loan money will be used up by the end of July. We have filled out the forgiveness paperwork and ready to send it in. The bank will tell us when they need it.

Pastor's Report: The second quarter statements were sent out. Pastor Cynthia and LeRoy Britton are registered for the Annual Conference. The cost is \$25 each as it will be a virtual conference and there will not be any meal or motel costs. Bishop Bard will lead Minnesota as an interim Bishop. Pastor Cynthia met with District Superintendent, Susan Nienaber last week for her yearly review. We will continue to worship online with First UMC. There are no plans to return to in-person worship at Hillside yet. There will be another drive-in worship service in the Coppertop parking lot in July. There were about 25 cars that attended in June. Pastor Cynthia will be on vacation July 27th thru Aug. 2nd. She is having zoom fellowship meetings at 10 AM each Tuesday for anyone who can attend. There were 2 participants last week. For the in-person parking lot fellowship times no one signed up. With COVID it is better not to have anything at church right now. Pastor Cynthia asked us –the Ad Council-to think about becoming, as a congregation, a member of the NAACP. This will show our support of people of color in our community and offer partnership opportunities on how we can serve and work for justice. We will take a vote on this at the August meeting. If you have any feedback about this issue, please contact one of the council members before August 4.

SPRC: The summer janitors are doing a good job. Our new secretary, Kathleen Pattison, is doing an excellent job organizing the office. All the older files from 2019 and older have been put in boxes to be stored. Brenna has offered to do child care at the church but a second adult would have to be present in the building.

<u>Trustees:</u> They will continue to do a walk-through of the church twice a week. Debby Johnson will fix the wall at the top of the stairs and wallpaper in the bathrooms.

<u>Hospitality:</u> National Night Out has been put off until October 6th by the Duluth PD. We are waiting for a word from the City if National Night Out will take place at that time.

<u>Mission:</u> There is \$400 in the Loaves & Fishes fund. This will keep us going for several months. A volunteer will come and pick up the ingredients for a meal on July 14th.

<u>Other:</u> We talked of having a meatball dinner in Sept. but it would be too risky with COVID. We will put it off and see if it could happen at another time. Maybe next spring.

The next meeting is August 4th.

Pastor Cynthia gave the closing prayer. Meeting adjourned.
